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20	COMPLAINT FOR DECLARATORY JUDGMENT
21	Ι.
22	Plaintiff seeks a declaratory judgment under 28 U.S.C. §§ 2201 and 2202 that
23	Arizona Constitution Article 2 § 37 ("Article 2 § 37"), attached hereto as Exhibit A,
24	conflicts with the rights of private sector employees under the National Labor Relations
25	Act, as amended, 29 U.S.C. § 151 et seq. ("NLRA") and is therefore preempted.
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1	II.
2	Article 2 § 37 is preempted by operation of the NLRA and the Supremacy
3	Clause of the United States Constitution (Article VI, Clause 2) because it prohibits
4	alternative routes to union representation that are authorized and protected by the NLRA.
5	III.
6	This Court has jurisdiction under 28 U.S.C. §§ 1331 and 1337. This action
7	arises under the NLRA and the Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution
8	(Article VI, Clause 2).
9	IV.
10	Venue is proper under 28 U.S.C. § 1391 because the Defendant resides in this
11	judicial district.
12	V.
13	Plaintiff National Labor Relations Board is an independent agency of the
14	United States, created by Congress in 1935 and charged with the administration of the
15	NLRA. 29 U.S.C. § 153.
16	VI.
17	Defendant State of Arizona is one of the fifty states of the United States.
18	VII.
19	On November 2, 2010, the voters of Arizona approved Article 2 § 37, entitled
20	"Right to secret ballot; employee representation," which is now in effect. Article 2 § 37
21	states "[t]he right to vote by secret ballot for employee representation is fundamental and
22	shall be guaranteed where local, state or federal law permits or requires elections,
23	designations or authorizations for employee representation."
24	VIII.
25	Article 2 § 37 applies to private employees, employers, and labor organizations
26	also subject to the NLRA.
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1	IX.
2	Section 7 of the NLRA, 29 U.S.C. § 157, provides in part that "Employees
3	shall have the right to self-organization, to form, join, or assist labor organizations, to
4	bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and to engage in other
5	concerted activities for the purpose of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or
6	protection, and shall also have the right to refrain from any or all such activities."
7	X.
8	Section 9(a) of the NLRA, 29 U.S.C. § 159(a), states in part that
9	"Representatives designated or selected for the purposes of collective bargaining by the
10	majority of the employees in a unit appropriate for such purposes, shall be the exclusive
11	representatives of all the employees in such unit for the purposes of collective bargaining
12	in respect to rates of pay, wages, hours of employment, or other conditions of
13	employment." Section 9(c) of the NLRA, 29 U.S.C. § 159(c), provides in part, in
14	circumstances where employees or employers file a representation petition and a
15	"question of representation exists, [the Board] shall direct an election by secret ballot and
16	shall certify the results thereof."
17	XI.
18	Section 8(f) of the NLRA, 29 U.S.C. § 158(f), states in part that "It shall not be
19	an unfair labor practice for an employer engaged primarily in the building and
20	construction industry to make an agreement with a labor organization of which
21	building and construction employees are members because [] the majority status of
22	such labor organization has not been established under the provisions of section 159 of
23	this title prior to the making of such agreement"
24	XII.
25	The NLRA permits but does not require secret ballot elections for the
26	designation, selection, or authorization of a collective bargaining representative where,
27	for example, employees successfully petition their employer to voluntarily recognize
28	their designated representative on the basis of reliable evidence of majority support, in

1	accordance with Sections 7 and 9 of the NLRA, 29 U.S.C. §§ 157 and 159, or where a
2	construction union seeks recognition from a construction employer in accordance with
3	Section 8(f) of the NLRA, 29 U.S.C. § 158(f).
4	XIII.
5	Because Article 2 § 37 of Arizona's constitution provides that a secret ballot
6	election is "guaranteed" wherever federal law "permits or requires elections" (emphasis
7	supplied), Article 2 § 37 requires elections where federal law does not and thereby
8	deprives private sector employees of their right to pursue the other options permitted by
9	federal law to designate, select, or authorize representatives of their own choosing and to
10	secure their employers' voluntary recognition of such representatives.
11	XIV.
12	Article 2 § 37 of Arizona's constitution creates an actual conflict with private
13	sector employees' NLRA Section 7 right to representatives of their own choosing. The
14	Amendment is therefore preempted by operation of the Supremacy Clause of the United
15	States Constitution.
16	XV.
17	In addition, even if it were fairly possible to construe Arizona State
18	Constitution Article 2 § 37 as only supporting the NLRA's guarantee of a secret ballot
19	election if the voluntary recognition option is not chosen, Article 2 § 37 is preempted
20	insofar as it creates a parallel state enforcement mechanism for protecting employee
21	representation rights that Congress assigned to the National Labor Relations Board. See
22	29 U.S.C. §§ 157, 159; U.S. Const. Art. VI, cl. 2.
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1	WHEREFORE, Plaintiff respectfully requests this Court:
2	1. To issue a declaration that Arizona State Constitution Article 2 § 37, to the
3	extent that it applies to private employees, employers, and labor organizations subject to
4	the National Labor Relations Act (29 U.S.C. § 151 et seq.), is preempted by operation of
5	the National Labor Relations Act and the Supremacy Clause of the United States
6	Constitution (Article VI, Clause 2); and
7	2. To grant such other and further relief as the Court may deem proper.
